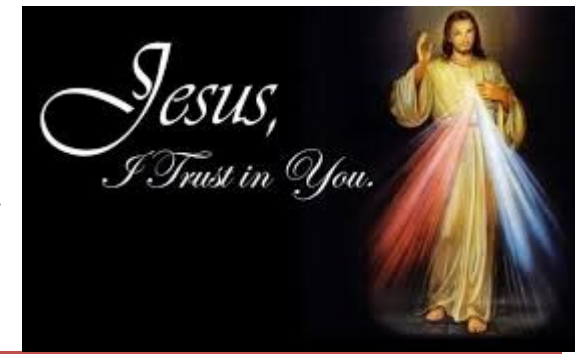

St. Agnes Parish April 23, 2017 Divine Mercy Sunday



From the Desk of Fr. Paul :

I would like to thank all who served in any way during the liturgies of these most sacred days, as well as to all who decorated the church and helped schedule and prepare the liturgies of Holy Week and the Triduum. The church looked amazing and the liturgies were beautiful. I would also like to thank all of you who were present- they were amazing days!

Although each year they have a certain repetitive predictability about them, this is the genius of ritual and certainly does not mean that they are ever the same, year to year. I can easily say that they were some of the best-attended liturgies of my entire time here at St. Agnes'. I was especially impressed with the much larger crowd at the Easter Vigil. I know that I was being a little bit provocative (but not intending to be flippant) when I said at the end of Palm Sunday masses, something to the effect, "is there anything else we can say about the Easter Vigil, besides that it is long? Anything else???" I have heard from a few people who took me up on my challenge and were delighted to have attended for the first time in their entire lives – and what a highlight it was for them! Yes! So thank you very much for sharing in prayer a beautiful 2 hours and 10 minutes on Saturday evening. It was splendid.

But overall, the lasting memory and meditation for me was the long lines of us waiting to receive the chalice during Holy Thursday's Mass. I have to say that the remarks I made to the congregation just before the Communion Rite began, encouraging as many of us as possible (and appropriate) to receive under both species that night, was very spontaneous; it was certainly not something I had given any thought to when I was preparing for mass. It just struck me in that moment that since we were there to celebrate the institution of the Eucharist at the Lord's Supper, Jesus' command to "eat" and "drink" was something that as many of us as possible should be encouraged to do. And you did! Lol! I would estimate that 90% of the congregation received under both forms. It came to me

as a spontaneous inspiration at the moment, but your response was amazing, and the image has stayed with me every since. It was the image of the People of God, pure and simple: one bread, one body, as St. Paul says at 1 Cor. 10:17. So standing at the altar, watching the long lines of people waiting to receive from the chalice, was truly very emotional for me as your pastor.

It was a beautiful and reflective time reminding me of St. Augustine's words concerning Holy Communion, "we become what we eat." In receiving the Body of Christ, we show ourselves to be the same. If I have any wistfulness regarding these past days, it is the reminder of what our parish would be like if the crowds were like this every Sunday – the entire Church throughout the world would be transformed if this was our regular, weekly attendance. However, without allowing that thought to tempt us to feel frustrated or insignificant, let us feel just the opposite: we can make a big impact if we are persistent in asking, inviting, proposing, and offering others we encounter the source of our joy that comes from our faith – so let's try and do that! Like the first disciples to have seen the Risen Lord, we too are sent out to tell and talk about this with others.

What we have experienced at Easter is not given to be personally hoarded but to be shared. Easter is the moment of being "sent forth" as the Church, just like the first disciples, to tell others what has occurred at the tomb. We bring this Good News to those in our families, to our places of work, neighborhoods, and broader community. In our manner, our speech, the look on our faces and the overall outlook on life that we convey, we are the "billboards" of the resurrection to others. So let the joy of Easter's full 50 days be with us, seen in and through us, sharing that joy with others. Christ is risen - ALLELUIA!

Adult Faith Formation Public Lecture: Catholic Education in Canada Today

The Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem - Canada Atlantic Lieutenancy will sponsor a public lecture titled: Catholic Education in Canada Today on April 25, 2017

This talk will focus on Catholic education in Canada, and some of the challenges to and for it. Beginning with some comments about the principles of Catholic education, Dr Sweet will point to a few areas in which there is promise for the future but also where there needs to be some significant practical change. Q & A will follow.

Dr. William Sweet is currently Professor of Philosophy and Director of the Centre for Philosophy, Theology, and Cultural Traditions, at St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish, Canada. He is also an adjunct professor of philosophy at Saint Paul University, Ottawa, and a member of the graduate faculty at the Dominican University College also in Ottawa.
